

Prevalence of stalking victimization

USA

According to the 2010
National Intimate
Partner and Sexual
Violence Survey
(NISVS), an estimated
15.2% of women and
5.7% of men have been
a victim of stalking
during their lifetimes.

(Breiding et al., 2014)



Prevalence of stalking victimization

EU

In the EU-28 survey, 18% of women experienced stalking since the age of 15, and 5% of women experienced it in the 12 months before the survey interview.

(European Union Agency For Fundamental Rights, 2014)





Prevalence of stalking victimization

Taiwan

According to a recent nation wide survey (n=1505), 3.79% of women aged between 18-74, have experienced stalking during their lifetime. (Pan et al.,2017)

Wang (2014) suggested that 89.5% of the abused women(n=379) reported experiencing intimate partner stalking.






More Statistics

- 1 in 8 female students have been stalked and harassed (MWF, 2014).
- 77.3% of those victims have experienced cyber-stalking (MWF, 2014).



Social media is becoming the major cyber stalking tool







No laws and lack of practical programs to respond to stalking and harassment problems in Taiwan



laws don't regulate these behaviors



the public doesn't acknowledge the dangerousness and seriousness of stalking



stalking victims don't know where to ask for help and get access to resources



the professionals(police, social workers, judges,... etc.) don't have the knowledge to respond to stalking incidents

Laws against stalking too soft: victims

stalking and harassment are not protected by the law," said Lai Fang-yu (賴芳玉), a lawyer and board member of the Modern Women's Foundation, adding that laws such as the Social Order Maintenance Act (2:37 秩序維護法), Sexual Harassment Prevention Act. (性腦擾防治法), Domestic Violence Prevention Act (家庭暴 方防治法) and Criminal Code treat stalking as an "incident" rather than repetitive and continuous behavior, punishable only by small fines.

"They said there was no law they could use and that while I could potentially sue him for stalk-The law allows restraining or- ing, that would only stand up if he has refused to leave when asked." she said. "Whenever police came, he would hide and then come back after they left."

> Huang said she was only able to get a restraining order after the man was caught breaking into her home.

Foundation deputy executive director Lin Mei-hsun (林美蕉) called for the passage of legislation to allow police to directly issue a restraining order after seeing a stalker once, citing a recent survey by the homes and changed jobs twice. Milestones: Anti-Stalking Law



2014

Special working group established.

Drafting of the bill.



2015

First draft completed.

Proposed by PM Pan Wei-Kang and passed the first reading, however delayed after.



2017

Supported by PM Wu Chi-Yang.

Host Public hearing.

Negotiate with the Executive Yuan (Administration)



2018/4/19

The Executive Yuan version is delivered to the Parliament and reviewed by the Internal Administration Committee on 12/13 Wait for seconding and third reading.



2019/4/30

Internal Affair Administration suspends all lobbying activities during bipartisan negotiation.

Parliament determine that the IAA shall modify the draft.

- Completed the Anti-Stalking Law draft and presented it to the Legislative Yuan (Congress) to be discussed
- Shed some light on the stalking problem in Taiwanese society
- Constructed the Intimate Partner Stalking Scale
- Established the SHARP program to provide services to stalking and harassment victims
